Understanding Juvenile Domestic Violence

- Many youth charged with domestic violence have *experienced or witnessed violence*.
- Exposure to violence increases risk of future violent behavior.
- Trauma, emotional dysregulation, and family conflict are common.
- Punitive responses often *fail to address root causes*.

Key Contributing Factors:

- Violence Exposure
- Developmental Differences
- Poverty & Instability
- Substance Abuse
- Mental Health Issues

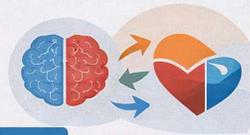


Guiding Principles

The foundation of our program rests on several guiding principles.

1. Trauma-Informed Perspective

- Understand behavior in context of lived experiences.
- Recognize learned coping strategies, survival responses, and emotional dysregulation
- Accountability is maintained.



“What’s wrong with this youth?” → “What has this youth experienced, and how does it shape their behavior?”

Trauma-Informed Practices in Action



Assessment-Driven Understanding

- Examine trauma, ACEs, mental health, environmental stressors to contextualize behavior.



Predictable & Structured Environments

Consistent routines and clear boundaries.



De-Escalation Over Confrontation

Staff respond with regulation strategies rather than power.



Skill Development Focused on Regulation

Emotional awareness, distress tolerance, impulse control



Relationship-Based Engagement

Model safe, respectful adult relationships while maintaining expectations

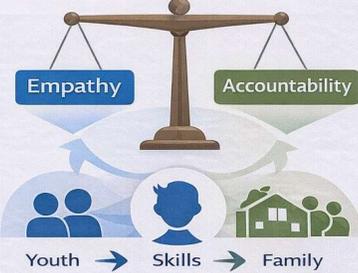
Accountability & Rehabilitation

Focus on repairing harm, not just punishment.

1. Who was harmed?
2. How were they affected?
3. What can be done to repair/prevent harm?

Operationalized through:

- Impact exploration
- Accountability conversations
- Empathy-building activities
 - Apologies or repair attempts
 - Behavioral commitments
 - Demonstrating changed interaction patterns
- Family engagement
- Aligns with best practices in juvenile justice and behavioral intervention

A Collaborative Program Development Process

Bridging Critical Gaps in Youth Domestic Violence Intervention

In response to a critical gap in interventions for domestic violence-related offenses committed by youth, we initiated a collaborative development process. This involved engaging court staff, prosecutors, defenders, administrators, probation staff, clinical professionals, and community partners to address the unique needs of this population while ensuring confidentiality and safety protocols.

Gap Identified → Stakeholder Collaboration → Program Design → Case Manager Established → Ongoing Evaluation

Domestic Violence Case Manager (DVCM)

- Bridges clinical intervention, court requirements, and family engagement.
- Provides individualized support
- Meets with youth and families at first court hearing
- Coordinates services and monitors progress
- Attends all subsequent court hearings
- Provides community resource information
- Develops tailored intervention plans

Building the Foundations for Effective Intervention

The development process followed several intentional steps. We began with a needs assessment to clearly identify service gaps and population characteristics.

- 1 Needs Assessment & SMART Goals**
 - Specific:** Clear objectives
 - Measurable:** Trackable indicators
 - Achievable:** Realistic targets
 - Relevant:** Align with purpose
- 2 Program Design & Curriculum**
- 3 Court Expectations & Safety Standards**
- 4 Facilitator Selection & Training**

Balanced Intervention Framework
Integrates age-appropriate rehabilitation with judicially responsible accountability standards.

Balanced Approach Development & Accountability

Developmental Focus

- Age-appropriate content
- Emotional regulation skills
- Conflict and relationship building.

Court Expectations

- Clear behavioral rules
- Attendance monitoring
- Zero tolerance for aggression

Establishing Group Norms & Safeguards

Clear structure and ethical standards are essential for maintaining safety, professionalism, and a supportive learning environment for all participants. These norms guide behavior and communication, ensuring a safe and respectful group dynamic.

Key Components Include:

- 1 Confidentiality**
 - Limits of confidentiality explained upfront.
 - Personal information remains private, except in cases where there is risk of harm, mandatory reporting, or court directive.
- 2 Respectful Communication**
 - Use of non-violent language, actively listening to others.
 - Offensive or discriminatory behaviors strictly prohibited.
- 3 Participation and Accountability**
 - Attend regularly, engage in discussions and exercises.
 - Complete assigned tasks, take personal responsibility.

Balanced Approach to Development & Accountability

- Developmental Focus**
 - Use of non-violent language, actively listening to others.
 - Offensive or discriminatory behaviors strictly prohibited.
- Safety and Boundaries**
 - Zero tolerance for violence, bullying, harassment.
 - Strict boundaries set to prevent aggression or disruptions.
- Ethical Practice**
 - Guided by trauma-informed principles, emphasizing empathy, fairness, and accountability.

A predictable, professional, and safe environment ensures that youth can engage, explore sensitive topics, and practice new skills without fear of judgment or harm.



Ensuring Continuous Evaluation & Improvement

A comprehensive evaluation plan was embedded from the outset, allowing for ongoing monitoring, accountability, and program enhancement. This proactive approach ensured that modifications were data-driven, timely, and aligned with best practices.

- 1 Session-Level Feedback**
 - Structured feedback forms and facilitator observations monitored engagement, skill acquisition, and group dynamics.
- 3 Facilitator Debriefing**
 - Weekly team meetings reviewed observations and discussed challenges to refine sessions as needed.
- 4 Facilitator Debriefing**
 - Weekly team meetings reviewed observations and discussed challenges to refine sessions as needed.

- 2 Behavioral Tracking**
 - Attendance, role play participation, homework completion, and adherence to group norms were tracked to monitor progress.
- Outcome Metrics**
 - Completion rates, skill mastery, and recidivism rates within a defined follow-up period were tracked.
- 5 Outcome Metrics**
 - Data collected guided iterative adjustments to the curriculum, session format, and facilitation methods based on participant needs and outcomes.



Continuous Improvement Loop

By continually evaluating our program's effectiveness, we ensured it remained evidence-informed, responsive, and aligned with both clinical best practices and the juvenile court system's expectations.



Participant Eligibility & Assessment

A comprehensive **clinical assessment process** is conducted to determine the suitability of each youth for **diversion-based intervention**. This ensures proper placement, protects group integrity, and promotes safety.

Diversion Eligibility



Program serves youth charged with domestic violence-related offenses appropriate for diversion-based intervention.

Placement is determined through a **comprehensive clinical assessment process** that:

- Treatment history
- Violence history
- Safety concerns
- Safety concerns
- Support systems
- Readiness and engagement potential
- Potential barriers to participation

Diversion Eligibility

This ensures proper **placement** and protects group integrity. Participation includes **informed consent and clear expectations**.

When youth are not suitable for the group setting, alternative referrals are provided. Individualized treatment planning ensures each youth's needs are addressed within the group framework.



Core Program Components

A holistic program design integrates multiple core components to address key factors in preventing and responding to youth domestic violence. Each component is crucial in fostering accountability, empathy, and behavioral change.



Diversion Eligibility



Victim Service Considerations

- Integrates victim services and safety planning to ensure holistic approach.

Treatment history

- Builds understanding of domestic violence dynamics through

- Engages families to support the transfer of learning into the home environment.



Case Management

- Provides individualized support, coordinates services, and ensures program compliance.



Skill-Building Sessions

- Focus on emotional regulation, communication, and conflict resolution



Restorative Practices

- Promote accountability and empathy development through restorative



Community Service & Collaborations

- Reinforces accountability and strengthens support networks through interagency.

Collaboration across agencies reinforces **accountability** and strengthens support networks.



Structured Six-Week Curriculum

This six-week curriculum is designed to guide youth through a structured progression from awareness to responsibility to skill integration, while maintaining flexibility to adapt to group needs.



-  **Week 1 Introduction & Awareness**
Domestic Violence Concepts & Awareness
-  **Week 2 Impact & Accountability**
Impact & Personal Accountability
-  **Week 3 Anger & Regulation**
Anger & Emotional Regulation
-  **Week 4 Empathy & Respect**
Building Empathy & Respect
-  **Week 5 Healthy Relationships**
Developing Healthy Relationship Skills
-  **Week 6 Application & Engagement**
Application & Family Engagement

The structure moves youth from awareness to responsibility to skill integration. While structured, the curriculum remains flexible to meet group needs.



Therapeutic Foundations

The therapeutic approach draws from multiple evidence-based foundations to address the complex needs of youth involved in domestic violence.

-  **Trauma-Focused CBT**
Informs emotional and behavioral interventions, helping youth process trauma and develop adaptive coping strategies.
-  **Play & Creative Expression**
Supports developmental engagement, allowing youth to explore emotions safely and meaningfully.
-  **Family Therapy Principles**
Guides relational interventions, improving communication and addressing systemic dynamics that contribute to conflict.
-  **Group Dynamics & Emotional Regulation**
Fosters peer learning, normalization, social skill development, and targets behavioral risks like anger, impulsivity, and aggression.

These approaches collectively address common mental health impacts, including anxiety, depression, trauma-related symptoms, and behavioral challenges associated with domestic violence. Sessions emphasize practical skills-building, including role-playing, real-life scenario practice, and between-session exercises, to reinforce learning and promote application outside the group setting. Facilitator training is essential to effectively deliver these interventions, ensuring fidelity to trauma-informed principles and alignment with court requirements.



Early Progress & Lessons Learned

Although still early in implementation, we have observed encouraging outcomes. Our initial cohort included four participants, with three successful completions. A subsequent cohort enrolled five youth, and we continue operating under a rolling admission model with a capacity of eight participants. Engagement levels have been positive, and referral accessibility has improved.



Key Lessons Learned:

-  **Collaboration** is essential

Benefits for the Court System

The program delivers multiple system-level benefits. By providing skill-based interventions, it helps reduce the risk of recidivism while offering structured accountability for participating youth. At the same time, it supports family stability and diverts youth from deeper involvement in the justice system. The program also strengthens collaboration among court staff, clinical providers, and community agencies.



-  **Enhances Accountability**
Ensures skill-building and compliance with court expectations.
-  **Reduces Recidivism**
Lowers risk of repeat offenses by addressing root causes.
-  **Supports Family Stability**
Improves family dynamics and fosters a secure home environment
-  **Strengthens Collaboration**
Fosters teamwork among court staff and community service providers

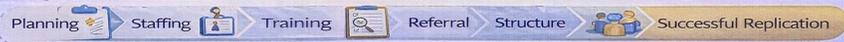
Collectively, these outcomes align with the court's rehabilitative mission, promote positive long-term community impacts, and achieve these goals in a resource-efficient manner.



Replication Guidance

For jurisdictions considering replication, several key factors are critical to success:

- 
Staffing Models: Ensure qualified clinicians and case managers are in place who have experience in trauma-informed care and adolescent behavioral intervention. Consider the dual-leader model (clinician + case manager) to balance therapeutic guidance with accountability.
- 
Facilitator Training Requirements: Provide comprehensive training in trauma-informed practices, adolescent development, cognitive-behavioral techniques, and group facilitation strategies. Include ongoing supervision and professional development.
- 
Referral Pathways: Establish clear processes for identifying eligible youth. Include a structured clinical assessment to evaluate treatment history, violence exposure, safety, engagement potential, and barriers to participation. Ensure alternative referrals for youth not appropriate.
- 
Group Size and Structure: Design sessions that are developmentally appropriate and allow for meaningful participation. Balance skill-building, restorative practices, and family engagement within a structured, predictable schedule. Consider rolling admission or cohort size limits.
- 
Community Partnerships: Engage local agencies that can provide complementary services such as mental health supports, victim advocacy, substance use treatment, and educational resources. Strong collaboration enhances continuity of care and reinforces positive outcomes.



Intentional planning, interdisciplinary collaboration, and commitment to continuous improvement ensure that replication is feasible, sustainable, and aligned with juvenile justice best practices.
